Les delighted in a well attended function; not entirely because he was concerned about the success of the function itself but because he saw so much other opportunity in the occasion. Les would have been pleased that his funeral service was so full of such other opportunities; not only the sad occasion of his passing.

Quietly, the coffin, draped simply in the altar cover from the Memorial Sanctum, which itself is embroidered with the names of some of our former Diehards, was borne into St.Marks and the Service of the Burial of the Dead proceeded. Together on this last occasion, Les, and so many of his friends who were able to be present, Worshipped the Lord their shepherd and dedicated themselves afresh to serve Him in their chosen way.

As the cortege proceeded to Golders Green Crematorium it passed slowly the Mansergh-Woodall Club outside which hung the Group flag made for one of those former occasions of which Les could feel so proud; perhaps the securing of the lease of the Mansergh or the Silver Jubilee celebrations of the Group. At his request the floral tributes were kept to a minimum; any contribution one desired to make could serve a purpose closer to his heart if given to the Group.

And so on this memorable golden jubilee of the Group, Les has completed his course and I am reminded of a prayer which must have been a favourite with him for I am so conscious of its use at eventide at camp

> O Lord, support us all the day long of this troublous life, until the shadows lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done. Then in thy mercy grant us a safe lodging, a holy rest, and peace at the last, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING for the life and work of LESLIE JAMES KIRBY Group Founder and President

I feel that I write only to record this time of thanks iving in print, for if one may judge from the size of the congregation gathered at St.Marks on the 18th July, there can be few Diehardians who were not present. Any attempt of mine to capture the spirit and feeling of the service will be inadequate and so I hope I may be forgiven for producing a factual report on what was essentially an emotional experience.

The service was conducted by Deaconess Dorothy Warwick and thoughtfully conceived and seemed throughout to reflect the character of Les. No mournful occasion this, but rather a time to give thanks for the example set for us all by our Group Founder.

Just before 3.15 p.m. a fine turn out of uniformed Group members and with representation from the City of Westminster District Rangers were lined up before the headquarters and marched off, flags flying, to St.Marks. The mood of the service, I felt, was set as the flags were borne into the church. Another moving moment was the renewal of the Scout Promise, the voices answering giving some indication of the large number of uniformed and Old Scouts present.

The address, given by Sir Thomas Robson, M.B.E., F.C.A., traced Les' scouting career from 1915 and spoke of his sacrifices for the movement, his courage, determination and humility. Sir Thomas remarked how he had failed, as all would, in an attempt to assess the numbers of boys influenced for good by the fine example set by Les, who in turn have passed on to others this example of service.

Sir Thomas referred back to the Lesson, which was read by George Scott and taken from Ephesians Chapter 6, and said that Les had surely taken on the whole armour of God, the shield of faith and the sword of the spirit, this sword, Sir Thomas added, Les has handed on bright in the service of Scouting.

Sympathy was expressed for those of Les' family and a special word for Elsie who had, said Sir Thomas, contributed so much to the happy home life which Les enjoyed.

Following the singing of the well loved hymn 'Abide with me' and the Blessing the service was concluded by the singing of the Scout Hymn, the last verse of which seemed so fitting as we remembered all that Les had meant to those of us who have enjoyed the privilege of his friendship -

> So as I journey on my chosen way. (play In all I do, my thoughts, my work, my Grant as I promise Courage Lord for me To be the best, the BEST that I can be.

The congregation was long in dispersing from outside the church but eventually the vast majority found their way back to HQ where some good folks had prepared tea and light refreshments, served by the Rangers.

Here the conversation was often, inevitably, of Les. One heard many attempts to assess the loss we have suffered, perhaps the best comment came when someone remarked that Les could never be (please turn to page 2 opposite)

LESLIE KIRBY

To many of us at Headquarters Leslie Kirby was a friend. A regular and always welcome visitor to our Canteen and a keen supporter of the Headquarters Christian Fellowship Group. Strictly speaking he had been one of us! Leslie was appointed Warden of B.-P.s Room at Headquarters in 1957 and remained so until 1961 when Baden-Powell House opened and the many treasurers at 25 Buckingham Palace Road were transferred to South Kensington. In fact, Leslie went too and was Archivist at the House until the Spring of 1962.

So much for facts to be found in records. Our knowledge is much greater from knowing the man himself. We all know of his tremendous work in the 8th St. Marylebone and in the District. His self effacing manner hid from any casual view both the work he did and the success he achieved. We liked to share his successess, to take pride in them and in him.

To some he may have appeared old fashioned. True he was justifiably proud of traditions but refused to be trapped by them and used them as starting points to further progress in the future. What mattered was the youngster of today and those to join Scouting in the years ahead. Leslie gave a great deal to very many and not least by his example of the Scout Promise in action and his continuing belief in young people.
